I like to think of Peter remembering how our Lord had stood upon the mountain and been transfigured before himself, St. James, and St. John. His face had shone like the sun, his garments were white as snow. Then a cloud appeared — the sign, for a Jew, of the presence of God — and a voice said: "This is my beloved Son." Our Lord had been there, with Elias and Moses. Then they had come down from the mountain and life had gone on as usual. I like to think too that St. Peter's mind traveled to a vision recorded in the Book of Daniel: "I beheld in the vision of the night, and Io, one like the son of man came upon the clouds of heaven. And he came even to the ancient of days: and they presented him before him. And he gave him power and glory and a kingdom: and all the tribes, peoples, and tongues shall serve him. His power is an everlasting power that shall not be taken away: and his kingdom shall not be destroyed." This magnificent figure was surely that of the Son of Man appearing in all his majesty to found a kingdom, a kingdom of all the elect. Might not St. Peter have had all this in mind as our Lord rode into Jerusalem? Now the Roman power would be overthrown. Now the enemies of the Lord among the Jews would be silenced once and for all — no matter that here at this very moment they were plotting against him. This was the moment of triumph.

Then a week passes. All is changed. They are not shouting "Hosanna" now: they are shouting "Crucify him! Crucify him!" A king? Why, he is crowned with thorns. Transfigured? Garments white as snow? Covered with spittle, blood and sweat. A prophet come to teach? Why, at Herod's palace they treated him like a fool. Poor Peter. Doubts cloud his mind. Disillusionment. He cannot run away completely. He hangs around, wondering why it's so difficult to persevere when the Master is now, it seems, in the hands of his enemies.
