EMBER DAY TO BE HELD WEDNESDAY, MARCH 5- An Ember Day is a day set aside for voluntary prayer and fasting. Archbishop Vlazny instituted Ember Days in the Archdiocese of Portland in 2002 as a way for the church in western Oregon to reach out to and pray for the victims of child sexual abuse and their families.

"I came into this world to divide it, to make the sightless see and the seeing blind" (John 9:39). The parables of Jesus propose the paradox of a faith perceived by the simple and disregarded by the wise.

Under the gaze of Christ, the light of the world, people choose either for or against him. Some pretend to see and know him. But they keep to their limited views, and it is by the measure of their narrow wisdom that they gauge the works of the divine envoy. If they refuse to believe in him, they can base their case only upon the blindness of their hearts: "We have no idea where this man comes from" (John 9:29).

The healed blind man knows only one thing: the man who opened his eyes must come from God. For him and for us, all of life depends upon this humble certitude. In spite of opposition, the newly sighted must look beyond the man and the prophet to the Son of God and the Lord. Only the totally free initiative of Jesus will allow this personal vision of faith. "You have seen him; he is speaking to you now" (John 9:37).

Through baptism the sinner is reborn from native darkness to the light of Christ. But the sinner must learn to see all things anew through the eyes of faith. Thus the whole Christian life is catechumenal; a slow climb through the shifting visions of this world, from the light received and imperfectly seen up to the total clarity of the day of Christ.

Fourth Sunday of Lent John 9:1-41

In today's Gospel, Jesus heals a man who was born blind. The Pharisees question the healing because Jesus performed the miracle on the Sabbath. The man is healed because of his faith in Jesus The Pharisees don't seem to be aware of the amazing miracle that has happened! That a man who has been blind his entire life can suddenly SEE, because Jesus healed him! Instead, they are troubled about the laws of Moses -- that Jesus performed this healing on the Sabbath, thereby breaking those laws.

Whom do you think we should be more like, the blind man or the Pharisee? How would you be more like that person?

Today the elect (that is, those people who are going to become Catholics at the Easter Vigil) celebrate the second scratiny as they follow the light of Christ. How do you show you are a child of the light?
