RETREAT FOR VETERANS, ACTIVE/RETIRED MILITARY AND THEIR FAMILIES

December 4-6, 2009 beginning with dinner at 7:00 PM on Friday and ending after lunch on Sunday. Our Lady of Peace Retreat House, 3600 SW 170th Avenue, Beaverton, OR 97006.

Retreat Master is Fr. Michael Drury, a priest of the Diocese of Helena, Montana. He was ordained in 1984 in Monterey, California and served for 14 years as an Auxiliary Catholic Chaplain at the Presidio of Monterey, as well as for ten of those years at the Ord Military Community Chapel (formerly Fort Ord). Fr. Drury is presently serving three parishes in Northwest Central Montana. Fr. Drury will bring studies in counseling and religious education to bear on his presentations as well as incorporating examples from the lives of the saints.

The beneficiaries of the Church's action, in this type of ecclesiology, are not exclusively, or even primarily, the members of the Church itself. Rather they are all those brothers and sisters the world over, who hear from the Church a word of comfort or encouragement, or who obtain from the Church a respectful hearing, or who receive from it some material help in their hour of need.

The Church's mission, in the perspectives of this theology, is not primarily to gain new recruits for its own ranks, but rather to be of help to all men, wherever they are. The special competence of the Church is to keep alive the hope and aspiration of men for the Kingdom of God and its values. In the light of this hope the Church is able to discern the signs of the times and to offer guidance and prophetic criticism. In this way the church promotes the mutual reconciliation of men and initiates them in various ways into the Kingdom of God.

Like other models of the Church, this servant ecclesiology has both strengths and weaknesses. Its strong claim to acceptance lies in the new situation in which the Church presently finds itself. Too much turned in upon itself, the Church has become increasingly concerned with its own internal affairs and correspondingly more estranged from modern civilization, to the point where communication between the Church and the world has become very difficult. This has brought about in the Church a loss of numbers, a loss of vitality, and a loss of influence. The language and structures of the Church have not kept pace with the development of human culture in general.

Two of Jesus' apostles ask to be given the seats beside him in the glory of heaven. Jesus tells them they do not realize what it is they are asking, and then he asks them whether they can go through everything he will go through. They say they can. Jesus responds by telling them they will go through those things, but that he cannot give them the places of honor in heaven because those places are already reserved. Jesus calls the apostles together and explains to them that although the rulers in the world are harsh and demanding leaders, the followers of Jesus who wish to be great should be a servant and a slave to others. He says, "The Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many."

What did Jesus do to show that he was a servant to others?
How can you be a servant too?
A "ransom" is payment made to rescue or save someone. What ransom did Jesus make?
Who was he rescuing?
