


Memorial of Saint Catherine of Siena

Doctor of the Church and patron saint of Italy, Catherine of Siena lived in the fourteenth century when famine, the black death, and wars greatly reduced the population of Europe. Catherine joined a group of Dominican laywomen, and dedicated herself to solitary prayer until she was called to an active life nursing the sick, and then as a peacemaker among feuding families, warring states, and a divided Church. She died at the young age of 33. The world needs peacemakers. Through the prayers of Saint Catherine, become a source of God's peace.

Thursday, April 30

Give a Play

Around 1030, a special hymn (a sequence) was written for Easter Sunday by the court chaplain to Emperor Conrad. It was called "Praise to the Paschal Victim" (Victimae Paschali Laudes), and it inspired many famous miracle plays. For centuries, on Sunday morning people throughout the world have enacted the visit of the holy women to the tomb, along with the angel's proclamation, "He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. . . . Then go quickly and tell his disciples . . ." (Matthew 28:6-7). Consider putting on a family drama during Easter. One person can read the Easter story while others act it out. Children might do this for parents and guests.



Friday, May 1

Saint Joseph the Worker

On this day, Saint Joseph is especially honored for his role as patron of tradespeople and workers. The fact that he is also the patron of Christian families underscores the simple truth that our work life ought to serve family life, not conflict with it. Today's families often feel an enormous tension between the demands of work and the needs of family. We can call with confidence on Saint Joseph to help us reconcile these demands.

Saturday, May 2

Memorial of Saint Athanasius

Athanasius was a famous fourth-century Bishop of Alexandria, Egypt, who defended the idea that Christ is both fully human and fully divine. At this time theological controversy was intense, and several times Athanasius was exiled to the desert, where he read, wrote, and observed the desert monks—men such as Saint Antony, considered to be the father of monasticism. Athansius's book, *Life of Antony*, is a spiritual classic. Spend time this week reading about the life of a spiritual hero, perhaps Saint Antony, Saint Catherine of Sienna, or Blessed Mother Theresa. Let their example feed your faith.



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
