

"I am the bread from heaven!" This solemn saying provokes scandalized murmurs from the crowd.

A tragic misunderstanding has arisen between Jesus and his hearers. Before identifying himself as the bread of life, Jesus shared the bread of ordinary people. For thirty years his life was marked by everyday meals, festival meals, funeral meals. At the end of those years, the crowd sees only the man who has shared their bread. "Is this not Jesus, the son of Joseph? How can he claim to have come down from heaven?" The heart of unbelief is to see in Jesus only the one who shares the bread of people, not the one who shared his own life in the bread. "The bread I will give is my flesh, for the life of the world."

Jesus is the one who gives the bread. We are tempted to reduce religion to the initiative of the one who decides for God. But it is God who first shares life with us.

Maybe we have grown too accustomed to the ways Jesus described his connection with us. He says in today's gospel that he is the bread of life and we are to eat of this bread. Further, that anyone who eats this bread will live forever. And the gospel ends with the startling words, ". . . and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world."

When he said this, he was saying that all he did, every moment of his life, was given for the life of others. That included us. He came to earth so that we might live life more fully. Often he had to stretch the meaning of ordinary language to communicate this profound truth of his life.

He lived serving others. He offered his presence, his time and energy to help those he met. We call this *altruistic* love. It has also been described as gift love. Surely such love is a miracle in itself. But it is not a miracle that is unusual.

Gift love happens all around us. Sometimes we are "guilty" of it. It's important to think about this because it's the most important event in the whole universe. It may be nothing more than getting a glass of water for a thirsty child or taking time to listen to a confused teen. Yet this sort of thing is at the very heart of God's creation. Jesus came to show us how to love like this.
