ST. ELIZABETH OF HUNGARY CHURCH

So Bonhoeffer writes, "What is bothering me incessantly is the question what Christianity really is, or indeed who Christ really is, for us today."

He describes "us today" in a Christmas essay written for friends in the resistance movement against Hitler. He titles the paragraph, "No Ground Under Our Feet."

One may ask whether there have ever before in human history been people with so little ground under their feet — people to whom every available alternative seemed equally intolerable, repugnant, and futile, who looked beyond all these existing alternatives for the source of their strength so entirely in the past or in the future, and who yet, without being dreamers, were able to await the success of their cause so quietly and confidently. Or perhaps one should rather ask whether the responsible thinking people of any generation that stood at a turning-point in history did not feel much as we do, simply because something new was emerging that could not be seen in the exisiting alternatives.

## SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

We have never seen anything like this!" (Mark 2:12). The Capernaum crowds are more fascinated with Jesus' healing of the paralytic than with his forgiveness of sins. The scribes, for their part, are indignant with this man who takes on himself the divine privilege of pardoning faults. They do not understand that Christ freed the body of the paralytic in order to show that he can liberate the spirit.

Faced with a similar manifestation of power, our reaction might be just as ambiguous as the enthusiasm of the people of Capernaum. Given the opportunity, we would line up to obtain from Jesus a bodily healing. We are not so quick to ask that our hearts be healed. We suffer no lack of words in detailing our aches and pains. We are much more reticent in baring our hearts.

Yet Jesus can change hearts. He has not come just to restore physical health but to pardon, to love us with that mad love of which God alone is capable. "See, I am doing something new! Now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? (Isaiah 43:10).
