If the Passover of the Lord (Triduum) is the wedding of the Lamb, then Christians seem to be poorly adapted to celebrating the honeymoon. The week of weeks which follows Easter Sunday is the seven weeks of Pentecost. Our perspective on this season would profit much from recognizing that these fifty days are Pentecost. Pentecost Sunday (the fiftieth day) is but the glorious closing of this season of the Spirit.

As Christ's rising cannot be separated from his suffering and death, as his glory cannot be known except by entering into his passion, so Christ's glorification at the Father's right hand and the sending of the Spirit cannot be known apart from that act by which the Father raised Jesus from the tomb. The book of Acts which marks this season in a special way recounts the beginnings of a community moved by the Spirit of he who had called the members together in his ministry. We do not begin this book the day after Pentecost Sunday. We, no less than the primitive Jerusalem Church, are filled with the Spirit at the baptismal festival of Easter. These fifty days are a time of heightened consciousness to the Spirit who makes us one in Christ.

These fifty days are a special sort of honeymoon for those who were fully initiated at the Easter Vigil. These are the first fifty days of full membership, a privileged time of celebration and formation. Traditionally these days were set aside for special catechesis about the sacraments. The days of Pentecost are the period of "follow up" after perhaps years of preparation, the intense scrutiny of Lent and the electric celebration of baptism during the Vigil.

The readings for this Second Sunday of Easter show the transformative power of the Resurrection for the early Church. In the First Reading from Acts, Luke describes the initial weeks after the Resurrection when the apostles performed "many signs and wonders," and Peter emerged as the powerful and charismatic leader of the Christian community in Jerusalem.

The post-Resurrection story in today's Gospel that describes Thomas's doubts also describes his transformation. In seeing and touching the resurrected Christ, Thomas is transformed from one who doubts even the possibility of resurrection to one who professes deep faith in the resurrected Christ: "My Lord and my God!" That same transformative power of the resurrected Christ is still available to those who suffer from doubts today, opening the way for all of us to profess our faith in Jesus as "my Lord and my God."

What "signs and wonders" do you find in today's Gospel? How do they speak to your faith at this moment?

Notice the image of "locked doors" in the Gospel today. What doors do you keep locked in your relationship with Jesus?
