First, there is the church. First, there is the church. FIRST, THERE IS THE CHURCH. This is not a typographical error. It has to be repeated (more times than above) because of a more fundamental error in our past and in our present. Christians simply cannot think straight or act right about any type of ministry WITHIN THE CHURCH, unless we first get some very wrong notions out of our heads and hearts and bones and marrow.

Somewhere along the line, we fell into an unbiblical and unChristian trap. And we got the idea that ministers come first, the clergy come first,...and only then the church. We got the crazy idea that God makes bishops (including the pope) first, and then the bishops and priests somehow create the church, the community of believers. We never put it that crudely. But that is about the way many of us think...and act.

Now we have to clear the air and begin to understand and feel again what was understood and felt for so long: that God covenants a people, a church, a community of initiated (baptized, confirmed, eucharistized) people. That is the grand and beautiful reality of grace and mission and sign--a people created in covenant worship to witness and to serve. That is what we have to get into our heads and bones and feelings again. Until we do, nothing we say about any ministry will make Christian sense.

Ministries come into existence because this church, this people, has need of servants for specific tasks and with specific talents. The number, type, character of such servants, or ministers, will vary from time to time as the needs of the church may change. But always the great encompassing reality is the church—the community of sisters and brothers—created by God to serve God's world.

This Fourth Sunday of Easter is also known as Good Shepherd Sunday. During this week, we might take time to meditate on the words of Psalm 23, a prayer Jesus knew and loved. Psalm 23 not only tells us what God is like—a caring shepherd—it also tells us how we should view ourselves. We are sheep, not shepherds; therefore we should seek to be simple and humble, following the voice of our shepherd and trusting absolutely in his ability, and desire, to provide for us.
