Now the whole history of salvation of the one human race is a single tremendous drama. We have already said that by the coming of the Word of God into the world, this sacred history has already entered its final phase, that a factor has already been established in this history which—though the lot of the individual may still be undecided—stamps it in its totality with the mark of finality. For the decisive truth of Christian faith is that the Lord is truly risen. And since it is in our humanity, in our flesh and blood, that he has risen, been glorified and taken up into the glory of his Father, that fundamental doctrine of Christianity proclaims from the start, that eternal glory is even now a possibility in the history of this world, this humanity and this flesh, already a possibility because in the flesh of Christ, which is a part of this world, it is already a reality..

Now faith tells us that Mary is the perfect achievement and work of redemption, and that this perfection of her grace has entered its final stage, because she has left this earthly life of space and time, and entered the phase of her life in which no new events take place in freedom as on earth, but the harvest sown within the confines of time is gathered into God's eternity. Mary, however, in her life on this earth was the highest, unmatched realization of redemption in a human being endowed with grace, as mother of God and consequently as the perfect type or representative of redemption in its very essence. And she has already attained her perfect beatitude—no one can doubt this who believes that she, sinless and full of grace, has accomplished her earthly course.

Family Faith Sharing Questions

Luke 12:32-48

When we read the Gospel of Luke, we often hear that the Jews (who believed that they were the "chosen people of God") had been waiting a long time for the coming of the Messiah and that Jesus was that Messiah. With the birth of Jesus, the Kingdom of God begins on earth. Today's Gospel reading tells us that when Mary was pregnant, she traveled to the "hill country" to visit her cousin Elizabeth. This may be seen as the first missionary journey of the new era—the age of Jesus the Messiah. The words of these two women tell us a little about what that age will be like.

How can each of us be part of the "missionary journey" of Mary?
What is your image of Mary as she undertakes this journey--the journey to visit Elizabeth as well as the journey she shared with her son?
Mary is presented as the voice for all the "chosen" of history. How are we called to share this message in our communities?
