A portion of the **Sharing our Faith**, **Shaping our Future Capital Campaign** will be to support seminarian education.

Many parishioners may be unaware of how the archdiocese helps its seminarians, and the financial facts of becoming a seminarian.

The Archdiocese provides tuition, room and board and transportation costs for our seminarians. The majority of our seminarians are housed and educated at Mt. Angel Abbey. The Archdiocese of Portland seminarians are not the only clergy candidates in attendance at Mt. Angel, but the Archdiocesan seminarians are the only students for whom we provide financial support. To become an ordained priest, one has to have a four-year college degree and four years of theological education. Archdiocesan seminarians are at various stages of their education, some with four-year degrees from other institutions, others completing their entire education at Mt. Angel. The Archdiocese supports our seminarians financially. Our seminarians are investing in our faith lives, and we want to support their calling to the vocation. They are giving their lives to Christ, to us, forever -- we want to support these men as best we can.

Through the Sharing our Faith, Shaping our Future Capital Campaign, we hope to secure the financial future for our seminarian education program. Our enrollment is up from just 14 seminarians a decade ago. We need future priests, but we also need a funding source to provide for their education and formation. With the success of the campaign, we will solidify and shape the future of our archdiocese by having a solid source of income for our seminarian education.

In this passage Luke is not opposing two states of life. There are not, on the one hand, contemplative aristocrats of the Christian life, and, on the other hand, the footsoldiers of the apostolic ministry. Jesus' answer to Martha is in no way intended to absolve those who would identify themselves solely with Mary. However, with Martha, occupied by a multiplicity of tasks, Jesus asks only one thing: to listen to his word in order to put it into practice.

All disciples meet the same challenge to balance service and contemplation. Zacchaeus, a model for the Christian disciple, gives half his material goods to the poor (Luke 19:8). The women who follow Jesus "assist him out of their means" (Luke 8:1-3). Yet contemplation of his word is also demanded of his disciples (cf. 10:23-24). Nor are women to be restricted only to "women's work."

They too, with men, are called to listen to his word.

Family Faith Sharing Questions

Luke10: 38-42

In today's Gospel, the story of Martha and Mary shows us the importance of making time to listen to the word of Jesus. Martha is upset because she feels she is doing all the work -- serving the Lord and everyone by cooking and cleaning, while Mary sits at the feet of the Lord listening to him teach. Martha complains to the Lord about her sister, Mary. Jesus tells Martha not to worry about the many things. There is need of only one thing, and Mary has chosen the better part.

How do you make time to listen to your friends and family?

When do you make time to listen to Jesus?
