The Gentile society of Luke's time had little regard for the dignity of women. Luke, in addressing himself to these hearers, is at pains to stress the role women play in Jesus' ministry and in the life of the Church. In today's passage Jesus is depicted as violating certain taboos in

order to welcome a repentant woman.

During the meal given for Jesus by Simon the Pharisee, the woman enters unexpectedly. Rabbinic custom frowned upon close contact between men and women outside the home. In addition, this woman is a public sinner. Ready to renounce her way of life, she now publicly puts her faith in this man who has come for people like herself. Her attitude stands in stark contrast to the calculated reserve of the devout Simon. Without knowing it, she is worthy of pardon. If it is true that people become what they are seen to be, we are transformed by Christ's look of love. In him death is not before us but behind us.

Let us remember especially that the Church is a community of pardon. All who have entered the common life of the body of Christ have done so by the way of pardon. And they remain in the Body of Christ only through pardon, through the mercy of Christ: not only of Christ, as Head, but also of Christ in his members.

The mercy and pardon of Christ must be continually at work in all the members and through all the members of the Mystical Body. This is what makes the Church truly a Mother: she gives life by gentleness, understanding, love and pardon. She forgives sins, that is to say she heals separation.

# **Family Faith Sharing Questions**

Luke 7:36 -- 8:3

In this gospel, a sinful woman enters the home where Jesus is eating. She begins crying, washes his feet with her tears, dries them with her hair, then breaks a jar full of oil and anoints his feet with it. A Pharisee says that if Jesus were really a prophet he would know that this woman is a sinner! Jesus tells a parable which shows that God's love and forgiveness is offered to all people, whether they have sinned a little or a lot!

Think about times when you have done something wrong or hurtful. How does it feel to know that God forgives you?
