## FEBRUARY 2 - PRESENTATION OF THE LORD/ CANDLEMAS DAY/ GROUNDHOGS DAY



We will celebrate *The Presentation of the Lord* at 8:30 a.m. Mass, *Candlemas Day*, with the blessing of candles, and *Groundhogs' Day* by singing Groundhog's Day Carols after Mass.

If you have candles you would like to have blessed, please bring them to the 8:30 a.m. Mass.

The Feast of the Presentation, often called Candlemas, commemorates the purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the presentation of Christ in the temple, which took place 40 days after his birth as Jewish law required. The name Candlemas comes from the activities associated with the feast: the blessing of candles for the year.

Although now overshadowed on the revised liturgical calendar, February 2 bore a weather folklore long before the shadowy groundhog. Farmers found the day a good time to make weather predictions, applying the theory that the rest of the winter would be the opposite of that on Candlemas. This means if the sun casts a shadow on Candlemas, you can expect more winter, but if there is no shadow, the end of winter is close at hand. If it sounds like the old groundhog story, it's because this is where that story comes from, except that the one about the groundhog originated only about a hundred years ago,

Paradox has sometimes been described as truth standing on its head. In today's readings the kingdom of God stands as the supreme paradox. In this kingdom everything which seems truly desirable is turned upside down. The prophet Zephaniah announces that those chosen to survive the dreaded upheaval of the "Day of the Lord" are not the rich and powerful but "a people humble and lowly." Paul informs the contentious Corinthians that God continues to choose not the wise, not the wellborn, not the strong, but the weak. Jesus himself claims that the genuinely blessed are not the prosperous and the successful but those who seem in fact badly treated by providence: the poor, the sorrowful, the needy, the persecuted.

What is this kingdom of God? Is it a home for riffraff? So it seems, according to the gospel. It is a place where tax collectors and prostitutes are welcomed before religious purists. It is a banquet whose guests have been gathered from the highways and the byways. It is a feast where the Lord himself sits down at table with sinners. It is not that the well-fed are unwelcome. Matthew, by offering a more spiritualized version of the beatitudes than Luke, suggests that the issue is attitude. Those who are well off by the standards of this world run the risk of complacency. Satisfied with all they have, they are content to seek no more. Not knowing they are hungry, they ignore the Lord's invitation to come and eat of the true bread of life.

Blest are they who know their need! They are free to seek first the paradoxical kingdom of God. And those who seek shall find.

#### 4TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"Blessed are they that have been persecuted for righteousness' sake: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." This does not refer to the righteousness of God, but to suffering in a just cause, suffering for their own just judgements and actions. For it is by these that they who renounce possessions, fortune, rights, righteousness, honour, and force for the sake of following Christ, will be distinguished from the world. The world will be offended at them, and so the disciples will be persecuted for righteousness sake. Not recognition, but rejection, is the reward they get from the world for their message and works. It is important that Jesus gives his blessing not merely to suffering incurred directly for the confession of his name, but to suffering in any just cause. They receive the same promise as the poor, for in persecution they are their equals in poverty.
