We move through life on a journey. We begin in one place. We move to another. We work at one job. We start another. Children are born. New families begin. Children grow and begin their own journeys. Our life's journey is filled with joy and sorrow, love and pain, frustration and peace. But there is another dimension to our life's journey: our journey toward God. The saints and mystics have called this the interior journey. It is our movement toward God, who transcends all of life.

In Lent we celebrate God's yearly call to go out again on a journey. This annual interior journey is meant to unsettle us, lead us forward, break up our daily routine. It is the call from God for this community to come from exile and go into the desert at the prompting of the Spirit, there to be tried and

tested. It is the call from Jesus, who said of himself; I am the way.

This is a journey with God and toward God as it was for the Israelites and for Jesus. Abraham, "the wandering Aramean," journeyed into the unknown. We are all wandering Arameans as we journey out our lives toward the promised resurrection purchased by him who has gone before us.

Today we celebrate the election of those who wish to be initiated into the Christian community at the Easter Vigil. These catechumens are on their journey with the community during this Lenten season. The catechumens move forward step by step toward the sacraments that mark the beginning of new life in Christ. They make their intention known to the church and are received into the household of Christ.

REFLECTION

During the 40 days Jesus spends in the wilderness, he undergoes thorough temptation. As his body is craving food, he is tempted to create loaves of bread and escape the spiritual discipline of fasting. As his mind prepares for his public ministry, he is tempted to seize great power in a worldly way, instead of the simple life of preaching, teaching, service, and sacrifice ahead of him. Finally, his spirit is tempted to test God to ascertain if God will be there for him through Calvary. Like us in every way but sin, Jesus's temptations grew out of the fears he may have had about carrying out his calling. Yet his trust in God was greater. What are your greatest fears? Take these in prayer to God as you entrust yourself to God's care.
