English organist and conductor Mark Williams will return to Portland this summer to direct the award-winning choir Cantores in Ecclesia in a nineteen-day festival featuring choral masterpieces by the great Renaissance composer William Byrd (1540-1623) and his teacher Thomas Tallis (1505-58=585). In today's liturgy we are once again invited to the great feast of God's kingdom. Throughout the scriptures this image of the messianic banquet evokes a sense of the abundance and the conviviality which will characterize the fullness of life to be enjoyed by all God's people at the endtime. The prophet Isaiah silences potential protests of unworthiness. All that is required to sit down at this table is awareness of one's need. Everyone who is hungry and thirsty is admitted free. The evangelist points out the extravagance of the meal. There is ample food for everyone, with plenty to spare. The apostle Paul, in the concluding passage from Romans, suggests the true nature of the feast. We are nourished and sustained by the overwhelming and unshakeable love which God has heaped upon us in Christ Jesus.

Today we feast together at the Eucharistic table which is foretaste and pledge of the banquet to come. Despite the prophet's words, however, our meal has its price. We must bring to the table the "loaves and fish" of our everyday lives to be transformed and shared for the nourishment of all.

We who are Church must go from the table to carry the bread of the kingdom to all our sisters and brothers who hunger and thirst for life.
