See bulletin board for more info on this and other Christmas programs in the Portland area. Today's gospel deals with the Baptist, that herald of an extraordinary event. The evangelist reports John's cry raised in the desert. He describes his mission to us: to prepare the way, to make straight the road. After a long silence during which there have been no more signs or prophets, God speaks anew. The echo of his voice rumbles across the solitudes announcing a decisive turning point in the history of the world. In an ultimate intervention which fulfills and overflows the ancient hopes, God will come.

But how? Will he show his presence like a meteor leaving a fiery trail across the lower reaches of the atmosphere before pursuing its course through the starry night? Will we only catch a glimpse, in the space of a flash of lightning, and then fall once again into the darkness which covers the world? No, for this Word which erupts into time changes all human history: "All flesh shall see the salvation of God." But to see him we must first die to ourselves in conversion. That is John's message.

It is in the midst of the discordant voices of history that God makes himself heard. By its life of justice, the community of believers ceaselessly sounds forth the invitation to humanity's new exodus.

Each Advent, the Church devotes the Second Sunday to the preaching of John the Baptist. John was a radical, itinerant preacher who lived apart in the desert. In an age when people were seeking political power to rid Israel of Roman occupation, he preached the coming of God's Kingdom and the need for repentance. John the Baptist challenges the status quo with both his preaching and his lifestyle. Advent is a time for us to ask whether our faith strikes others as radical and countercultural. Do we appear to the world as full of conviction for the coming of God's Kingdom, or are we content merely to fit in?
