## *Reflection*

After the young man sat up and began to walk "Jesus gave him back to his mother." This event illustrates the deep concern Jesus had for each individual and the relationships between individuals. In the case of the young man raised from the dead, the mother needed him as only a mother can, and he needed her presence and care to make sense of the momentous events that happened to him.

We are given into one another's care through our family relationships and in friendships where we voluntarily take on concern for another person. These relationships are a network which supports us in a myriad of ways--psychologically, spiritually, socially, and even physically.

Our relationship network is a living structure, and like all living things, it needs nurturing and protection from harm. Human frailty and sin can damage relationships. Relationships need the gift of time and the best of us, which means they need to be an important priority in our lives.

In all our relationships, whether they are flourishing or in need of some repair, the Holy Spirit is present and ready to be involved in moving them towards life and health. We are not alone with one another, and the measure of divine concern for the relationships we share with one another is revealed in Jesus' response to the death of the young man and his mother's grief. If you are struggling in a relationship, pray about it, and ask for the Holy Spirit's intervention.
