

The episode of the ten lepers follows from the parable of humble service read last Sunday. It again invites us to wonder at the gracious gifts of God. On his journey to Jerusalem, Jesus meets leprosy, an illness which cuts the sufferer off from worship and the presence of others. Like those poor in the psalms who call on the loving tenderness of the God of the covenant, the lepers cry out to the one in whom they discern a savior. In sending them first to those who are qualified to verify a cure, Jesus not only makes them a promise, he also puts their faith to the test. For, at that moment, they are not yet cured. They are healed "on the way," by obeying Jesus' word. Then, filled with joy, but forgetful of the giver, they scatter.

There is one exception, a Samaritan, a foreigner! For him alone the journey of faith is not complete until he returns to the giver of the gift. Jesus continues the dialog by sending him forth once more, this time as a disciple.

# Reflection

Nine were cured but a tenth was healed. He was a man of another country, not liked by the followers of Jesus, yet his heart was like Jesus' heart - thankful and light.

The word 'thanks' can change everything. It is one of the most important words between people who are in ordinary and consistent relationships -- those we love, our co-workers, those we live with -- it is a word that deepens the bond among us.

The Christian heart is a grateful heart. We sometimes find people whose lives are very difficult and disabled on the outside but have a heart of thanks and joy on the inside. They are the people who give thanks for what they have, rather than whine over what they have not.

The thanks of the Samaritan brought him into a sort of unity with Jesus and with the others who looked on him as a foreigner. Thanks can bring enemies together. When we give thanks for the same things, we shatter barriers.

The nine were cured, and probably did well for Jesus in their reports. But the tenth brought the new life of Jesus to others from a grateful heart.

Give thanks this day for the ordinary, for the people who are always there, for the goodness of God. Give thanks, and in giving thanks we will be more like Jesus, the one whose life and words thank God, the Father of us all.
